XL Bully Ban Guidance

The government has recently added the XL Bully dog breed to the list of dogs banned under the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991. This is following an increase in attacks and fatalities caused by the breed. The laws will come into force in 2 stages to help current owners adapt. From 31st December 2023 it will be against the law to:

- · sell an XL Bully dog
- · abandon an XL Bully dog or let it stray
- · give away an XL Bully dog
- breed from an XL Bully dog
- · have an XL Bully in public without a lead and muzzle

From 1st February 2024 it will be a criminal offence to own an XL Bully dog in England and Wales unless your dog has a Certificate of Exemption.

Check if your dog is an XL Bully dog

There is extensive advice and an official document defining the breed type, characteristics and objective measurements on the UK Government website. Shown in the box are images of XL Bully examples.

Want to keep your XL Bully?

If you wish to keep your XL Bully dog following the ban enforcement, you must apply for a Certificate of Exemption by 31st January 2024.

In order to get a Certificate of Exemption you must do the following:

- Get third party public liability insurance cover for your dog
- Neuter your dog permanently if it is not already neutered. A vet must confirm if your dog is already neutered and fill in the 'confirmation of neutering form' (contact the vets who neutered your dog).
- Pay the £92.40 fee for each Certificate of Exemption for each dog you want to keep
- Apply for a Certificate of Exemption at www.gov.uk online, by email, or post. You will need to provide the microchip number of your dog.

Further requirements to keep an XL Bully dog:

- Microchipped
- Kept on a lead and muzzled at all times when in public
- Kept in a secure place so it cannot escape
- Neutered
- The owner must be over 16 years old

Giving up an XL Bully dog to be euthanized

If you decide not to keep your XL Bully dog, it should be taken to

a registered vet practice to be euthanized by 31st January 2024. Our friendly team at Dalehead Vets are trained to help you in these difficult circumstances and offer support and guidance if you require. The government are offering £200 compensation towards the costs of euthanasia if you apply before 15th March 2024.

Our role as Vets

As Veterinary professionals it is our responsibility to be aware of the XL Bully breed and educate owners on the ban. We are also responsible for animal welfare and providing euthanasia should an owner wish for this option. We are not expected to report XL Bully dogs and their owners to the police, it is the owner's responsibility to comply with the law.
